"Food for thought is no substitute for the real thing."



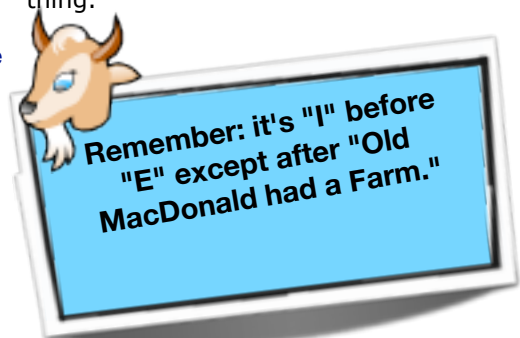
